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City Hot Spots

The Riverfront
The riverfront area is popular with locals and tourists alike. North of Royal Palace and National Museum, the riverfront area roads are lined with restaurants, bars, shops and spas. Busiest in the early evening but a great place to stroll any time of day or relax at a streetside cafe to watch the passing scene.

Royal Palace area
The Royal Palace and National Museum sit side by side at the riverfront. Street 240 behind the Palace is home to a small collection of boutiques, shops and a few restaurants. Street 178 next to the Museum is lined to the riverfront with art shops and cafes. Nearby Street 172 is now a busy and burgeoning budget traveler street lined with inexpensive bars, restaurants and guesthouses.

The Independence Monument area and BKK1
BKK1 is the 'foreigner's quarter,' home to NGOs, expats and dozens of hotels, restaurants and shops, especially at the northern end. East of Norodom Blvd the narrow streets are dotted with boutique hotels, little restaurants and bars, especially along Streets 308, 29, 21, and in the micro-bar enclave of Bassac Lane.

Phsar Toul Tom Pong (Russian Market) area
The TTP area is a residential part of town centered on the 'Russian Market,' the city's most popular traditional market. The surrounding blocks are dotted with unique little cafes and bars - from Mexican, to Indonesian and Spanish tapas.

Street 51 bar street
Late evening Street 51 (between Streets 174/154) becomes one of the hottest bar strips in town. Several hostess bars, a few neighborhood pubs, a beer garden market and some of the town's most popular clubs including Pontoon and The Heart of Darkness, all busy till early morn.

Money and ATMs
Though Cambodian riel is the official currency, US dollars are in common use. Regardless of small variations in the daily exchange rate, many businesses treat 4000R=US\$1 as the standard. ATMs dispense in US dollars.

Internet and Phones
Phone and internet are easy. Phnom Penh offers what is probably the most widely available free wifi in Southeast Asia. And SIM cards with phone number and internet access are available at any of the many phone shops scattered across town, and even on-arrival at the airport. Passport and visa required.

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Day Trips

There is a lot of Cambodian history and culture within a daytrip's distance of Phnom Penh - Silk Island on the Mekong, Angkorian ruins in Takeo, the old capital of Oudong - and just the process of getting there offers a nice glimpse of rural Cambodia. It is easiest to arrange a tour or transportation through a travel agent or your hotel, usually a daily tourist van or boat.

Silk Island (Koh Dach)
Set aside a half-day for a boat trip to a rural silk weaving village on Koh Dach island. Arrange a visit through your guesthouse, travel agent or contact CamboCruise at 092-290077.

Oudong
The abandoned 17th century capital sits amongst the hills west of Phnom Penh. Stupas containing the remains of Cambodian kings cover three hills, which also provide an excellent countryside view.

Phnom Chisor
Atop Phnom Chisor sit some well preserved 10th century Angkorian ruins. The 503 steps to the top make for a rigorous climb but the quality of the ruins and the amazing view make the effort worth it.

Phnom Da
The hill of Phnom Da sits about 20km from Angkor Borei and is crowned by an impressive 11th century Angkorian-era prasat (tower) displaying some carvings in pretty good condition.

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
